I am no longer surprised when I see fellow seniors being motivated by change, very comfortable in using laptops as they tap and go throughout the day, using their computer or phone to buy tickets to the rugby for their grandchildren,

As previously mentioned, our challenge in 2014 is to change our direction from <u>recruitment</u> to increasing <u>participation</u> on the lawn by encouraging our members involvement and develop a culture of learning and advancement for players to improve their game and enjoyment of the sport of croquet. With one lawn and some sixty members, 42 affiliated, we are a small club in size carrying a large membership that has a self-propelling ability to keep on growing if not checked.

Based on affiliation numbers within Croquet NSW we are one of fourteen clubs having one lawn. Membership-wise we are positioned 37 out of a total of 70 clubs in NSW/ACT.

To support participation our Club Captain is about to submitting to the committee for their consideration two initiatives, one to quicken social playing time for the Friday and Saturday players, The second initiative is to increase the number of Pennant teams. These initiatives are mentioned briefly in the Club Captains report.

Lawn renovation:



As advised, the Croquet lawn was taken out for renovation on the 2/1/24 and is scheduled to be back in play on Saturday the 17^{th of} February. A loss of valuable playing time, but necessary to meet the increased demand and playing traffic for the year ahead.

A lot of the invisible work had been done to date, spraying pesticides and herbicides for weeds and bugs, dropping the cut height at every mow to make it easier to scarify and brush. Unfortunately, the recent bout of rain has attracted pests and unwanted growth resulting in a respray , a second scarify and brushing.



The hot weather forecast for next week will allow for some eight tons of topsoil to be rubbed in followed by the implementation of a fertilizing and watering program to establish fresh soft grass within days.

Another week will see the grass established and begins to closeup, at which point in time the greenkeepers will hand-sharpen the cylinder mower blades and begin the process of consistent mowing and rolling the lawn to a point it is true and flat, revealing a carpet of lawn with that Queensland blue couch look about it, ready for some serious croquet.

This year the edge of the lawn has been widen by another meter allowing for the lawn boundary markings to be moved to three positions during the year in an effort to reduce the wear around the hoops,

Subject to discussion and agreement by the WCC committee, I am keen to introduce the following initiatives to support growth in participation during 2014:

- Introduce a time focus perspective on all social games of Golf Croquet.
- Establish two teams of five players each, to compete in the 2014 - Division 3 Pennants season.

Interesting feedback from pennant level players who visit our club is on the time taken by some of our members to assess, consult, decide, and execute their shot and the impact this has on the time to complete their game.

This initiative adopts a 2-fold strategy:

Firstly, Introduce and promote a Time limit per game rule.

Secondly, introduce and promote a "Time limit to play your stroke rule. Similar to the time limit rules applicable in Pennant and State/District competitions.

Our new social members have developed the base skills and have the capacity to adopt to 'time focus' play.

The second initiative to establish two Pennant sides, requires strategies to assess:

- Selecting our ten best and willing Pennant Players
- Establish pre-season training sessions and /or considering engaging a paid professional coach to prepare the players for the rigours of Pennant play & tactics.
- Establish outside referees for home games.
